

Corporate Governance in the Common-Law World: The Political Foundations of Shareholder Power

Professor Christopher M Bruner

Washington and Lee University School of Law

Professor Bruner will discuss his comparative research on how stakeholder-centric regulatory structures notably social welfare protections available to employees – affect the degree of shareholder-centrism exhibited by corporate governance systems in common-law countries, including Australia, Canada, the United Kingdom, and the United States.

Christopher Bruner is an Associate Professor and Ethan Allen Faculty Fellow at the Washington and Lee University School of Law. His research and teaching focus on corporate law and securities regulation, including international and comparative dimensions of these subjects. His comparative study of U.S. and U.K. corporate governance won the 2010 Association of American Law Schools Scholarly Papers prize, and he is currently at work on a book developing a comparative theory of corporate governance in common-law countries. Professor Bruner has presented his scholarship in Denmark, Mexico, Switzerland, the United Kingdom, and the United States, and has consulted on corporate law reform in the Russian Federation.
